Tips & Tricks for a Sustainable Conference

Here are some tips and tricks to make your conference/event more sustainable:

- Ensure that recycling, garbage and compost bins are set up at the venue and that all waste is disposed of properly.
- Reduce or, where possible, eliminate plastic waste by providing reusable or more sustainable options (ie. metal or bamboo cutlery, digital brochures as opposed to paper versions).
- Purchase environmentally friendly food and beverage items, by sourcing locally and/or providing vegetarian and vegan options.
- Donate any leftover food to shelters.
- Where possible, host events outside, or book venues that are certified sustainable (ie. LEED buildings).
- Avoid unnecessary carbon producing transport, by walking or using public transport between events.
- Where possible, partner with sponsors and speakers who support environmental initiatives or have sustainability action plans, and avoid working with those who are involved in work that negatively impacts the environment.
